

HASLETT, MI, August 13th, 2024: The International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) is pleased to announce Snowmobile Day will be held on October 26th, 2024, and International Snowmobile Ride Day on February 8th, 2025. These events are geared to celebrate the sport of snowmobiling and the upcoming winter season. Snowmobile clubs, local dealers, associations, and snowmobile groups are invited to participate in these events.

Snowmobile Day aligns with "Snöskoters Dag," an event that has been held in Sweden for over 40 years. ISMA encourages snowmobile clubs to partner with a local snowmobile dealership as the location of the celebration, bringing members of their community together while supporting local business.





Over the past three years many new riders have entered the sport and Snowmobile Day is a great opportunity for clubs and associations to increase membership and recruit volunteers for trail maintenance activities. Snowmobile Day should be a fun, family festival type event, where BBQ, refreshments, music, vintage sleds, and an open house can get snowmobilers looking at the new products in the market and getting excited for the upcoming season.



International Snowmobile Ride Day was launched 2 years ago by Bombardier Recreational Products (BRP), manufacturer of the Ski-doo and Lynx. Responsibility for the event has now been handed over to ISMA. The event encourages riders of all brands of snowmobiles to get out and ride on the second Saturday of February.

ISMA encourages Snowmobile Clubs to host an event such as an open house at a Clubhouse, Hot Chocolate at a trail intersection, or BBQ at the trailhead to celebrate this day.

Groomer Building Extension

The Columbia Gorge Snowmobile club last year received money to extend the groomer building to allow more space for their second grooming cat. This year they got the rest of the money to complete the concrete, electrical, insulation and heat. The club members started last month building the forms and placing the iron and rebar. The concrete will have to be done in two pours because of the size of the pads. The first one was done on September 19th and the second on September 27th. A very big thank you to Dave Rogers and Charles Rogers from Seal Kote Plus for providing the heavy equipment to get the ground ready and drain pit dug.

Big Thank you to Mike Hannifan, John Vogel, Dave Mills, Dwight Moe, and Dan Gill for help pouring the whole concrete. It takes a lot of hands to get this type of job done. The next step will be getting the electricity, insulation and heat in before the start of winter.

Snowmobile Trail Volunteerism in the United States

This year the International Snowmobile Council completed a survey of clubs and the amount of volunteering necessary to create and maintain snowmobile trails. Many clubs participated in this survey from the US. We are sharing that information with you. Many snowmobilers do not realize that the trails they ride on are primarily done by club members who volunteer their time because of their love of our sport. Yes, volunteers are what keeps our snowmobile trails open! What does it take to get it to a condition we enjoy riding on? There are many parts to setting up a snowmobile trail.

- Working with the state Department of Parks/Natural Resources to confirm acceptance of the trail.
- Grants must be completed and submitted to the DNR or other state agency for approval to receive funding to pay for the cost of equipment, maintenance of their groomer and drag, and other equipment needed for trail work. Most of the planning, decisions, operating and paperwork is done by volunteers.
- These club volunteers must go to each landowner for permission to cross their land to obtain a legal agreement for permission to do so. Each club in the survey averaged needing signatures on 28 contracts. But it does not stop with

the landowners, these club volunteers must maintain contact with them to keep the trail open and for any extraordinary circumstances that may need to be addressed, like trespassing. The average club spends 24 hours doing this.

So, how many trail miles does a club brush and clear for when snow comes? The survey suggests they manage about 348 miles with about 135 hours by volunteers preparing the trail. Oh, it also takes another 111 hours per club for properly installing/removing the trail signs!

Then, once snow comes volunteers operate the groomer with a drag to groom the trails. The average club groomer 1,172 miles of trail during the snow season traveling at about 4 miles per hour. Don't forget the volunteer labor time to operate the groomers which is an average of 366 hours per club. According to the survey, the average club has 5 volunteers operating the groomers and maintaining their equipment during the season.

During the season equipment must be maintained, again by volunteers, that amounts to 46 hours per club. Trails must be regularly checked for fallen trees and other debris that must be removed. The volunteer hours for this are 243 hours per club.

Many times, I have met snowmobilers on the trails who have no concept of what it takes to ride on a wellgroomed trail. Many riders assume that state employees do the work! Many riders are not familiar with state snowmobile associations, that the clubs belongs to that are maintaining the trail with volunteers.

Hopefully this information gives you a better perspective of what it takes for trail systems and to appreciate the volunteers that work to make your snowmobiling day exciting and safe.

When you're riding, think about joining the club whose volunteers maintain it. They can use your financial help. Furthermore, you may find joining the club beneficial to find more people to ride with next time!



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No Trespasing Snowmobile Awareness Contest

The American Council of Snowmobile Associations today announced the 2024-2025 No Trespassing Snowmobile Awareness Contest. This Contest will include snowmobilers of all ages, from the little ones through the experienced riders and will generate the conversation and awareness of snowmobilers across the U.S. on an issue that impacts snowmobile access. Too often volunteers are left scrambling trying to re-route snowmobilers because of trespass incursions by snowmobilers that do not understand the consequences of riding on trails/areas that are off limits to snowmobilers.

Creating the awareness of the importance of riding where marked will assist the over 2,500 snowmobile clubs across the northern tier of the U.S. "Areas that are not marked for snowmobile use are often a safety issue, with rocks or downed trees, as well as protected because of crops", says Karyn Robare, Committee Chairman with the American Council of Snowmobile Associations. "Volunteers find themselves spending valuable time with land owners or land managers that could be better spent creating new trails or maintaining the existing trail system of over 100,000 miles and thousands of acres of riding areas."

The Contest includes the following categories to promote rider responsibility, including the need to respect Land Owners and Land Managers that allow us the privilege of riding by Not Trespassing.

Snowmobilers up to the age of 6: <u>Coloring Contest</u> Snowmobilers between the ages of 7 -12: <u>Word Search</u> Snowmobilers between 13 – 17: <u>Create a Meme</u> Snowmobilers over age 18: <u>Create a Video no longer than 30 seconds</u>

TRESPASSING Threatening snowmobiling access everywhere!

I believe, or at least I hope, I am preaching to the choir here. If you are a club member you should already know that you are only allowed to ride where you have permission. But we also know that is not always the case with everyone. Too often we are seeing snowmobilers riding where they are not allowed, by definition, trespassing.

Trespassing is a problem across the county. In the trails riding areas where trails are located on private property, landowners typically only allow snowmobiling to use their property on a designated corridor and any riding outside of the marked trail without permission is considered trespassing. This not only leads to a closure of a trail across one property, but it also often results in the closures of an entire section of a trail system. Many times we have found trespassing may have triggered a trail closure, but other underlying issues may have contributed, such as loud pipes or personality conflicts with club members or government officials. Regardless, this requires club volunteers to work with local landowners to create a new trail or in some cases, a permanent loss of a trail.

Even in areas when snowmobiles are allowed on public lands, it may not mean you are allowed to ride everywhere. In areas where most snowmobiling takes place on public lands, it is important to know there are areas where snowmobiles are not allowed. Riding in areas off limits to snowmobiles is considered trespassing. It is every snowmobiler's responsibility to know where they can legally ride and where it is prohibited.

While laws vary from state to state, trespassing will result in a fine if caught. Even more important, trespassing costs us access.

What has the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) done about the problem? We have used social media to bring attention to the issue and encouraged snowmobiles to use the Snowmobile Manufacturers "Take the Pledge" campaign. ACSA has held several contests to bring attention to trespassing. We are currently holding another contest for all ages, to bring attention to the issue through the youth and hopefully their parents. Participants may have a chance to win prizes by submitting coloring pages, a word search, memes or a short video. For more information go to the ACSA website at *www.snowmobilers.org.*

What can you do? When someone riding in your group rides where not allowed, call them out and explain to them why it is a problem. If you catch someone trespassing report them to your local law enforcement. Let your local law enforcement know where problem areas are, so they know where to best use their resources when patrolling. Clubs can also use their social media pages to bring attention to trespassing. Make sure your trails have appropriate signage to educate everyone to stay on the trail and only ride where allowed.

We ask clubs who experience trail closures resulting from trespassing to report them to their state snowmobile association so we can show the true cost of this issue. We find many times clubs just react to the closure by finding a re-route.



We encourage everyone to be part of the solution, not part of the problem!







With fall rapidly approaching the Hi Desert Storm Troopers are excited for another winter season of grooming and snowmobiling. Over the summer we have been busy getting our snow cat repaired as we lost our implement hydraulic pump at the tail end of the 2024 season. We will soon be beginning our preventative maintenance and checks to ensure a trouble-free grooming season for this winter.

Caleb is actively progressing through the AMGA ski guide program in hopes of certification. He completed an AIARE level 3 course in 2014, and is currently an AIARE course instructor. He looks forward to a winter in the Wallowas-getting to know the terrain, snowpack, and people.



Kelly grew up in Eastern Wyoming where she started exploring the Big Horn mountains on snowmobiles and dirt bikes at an early age. During that time, she also learned to ski in the South Dakota Black Hills. Kelly moved to Montana for her undergrad and was introduced to backcountry skiing. After many years of school and earning her Ph.D. from Oregon State University in 2009, the began a career as a professor at Eastern Oregon University, where much of her work focuses on public health and research in outdoor physical activity including the study of behavior in outdoor environments. Since 2017, Kelly has helped organize and run operations at the Wallowa Avalanche Center, including teaching avalanche nourses for both motorized and non-motorized users. In 2019 Kelly took her Professional Level 1 Avalanche Course and will be taking her Professional Level 2 Course this February. Last winter Kelly completed her AIARE Instructor Training Course at Togwotee, WY on a snowmobile. Kelly is a Professional Member of the American Avalanche Association, a guest host on the Avalanche Hour Podcast, and lias also completed her AMGA Alpine Skills Course



ACSA SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION 2025

The American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) scholarship is available to either graduating high school seniors or persons currently enrolled in college or trade school full time (*12 semester credits*), either physically or online. Scholarships will be given to the winners regardless of other grants or scholarships that the students may also receive.

Requirements are as follows:

- 1. The applicant or immediate family must be a paid member of a state snowmobile association, and the state association must be a member of ACSA.
- 2. The applicant must submit the completed application form.
- 3. The applicant must submit a cover letter. This letter must include the student ID number and college/trade school name and the address to which a scholarship check would be sent to.
- 4. The applicant must submit a resume detailing his/her involvement in snowmobiling as well as extra-curricular activities.
- 5. The applicant must submit an essay (*essay subject located on the Application Form*). The essay **MUST** follow the format below to be accepted and should be sent in **Word or Google Docs**:
 - a. <u>Minimum</u> of 2 pages typed.
 - b. Double-spaced.
 - c. Font Times New Roman.
 - d. Font size 12 point.
 - e. Margins set to 1 inch for all margins (top, bottom, left side, right side).
 - f. Page numbers (if included) should be .5 inch from the top of the page (not within the 1" margin).
 - g. A header (*for example, the essay question*) can be added 1 inch from the top of the first page, and then enter a double space and begin your essay.
 - h. Do NOT use bold-faced type or other special settings.
 - i. If work is cited, please add an additional 'work-cited' page at the end of the essay. This information will NOT be counted as part of the 2-page minimum.
 - j. The essay must follow the essay topic or be disqualified.
- 6. The applicable documents must be received via email at the ACSA Office by February 1, 2025. Please email to info@snowmobilers.org using a subject line of ACSA Scholarship Application.
- 7. Any entry that does not meet ALL of these requirements will be disqualified. <u>NO EXCEPTIONS</u>.

Additional rules:

- 1. Students must use the scholarship within one year of receiving it.
- 2. All scholarship checks will be written directly to the college and not to the student. <u>No Exceptions</u>.

All applicants will be notified of the final scholarship selection by April 15, 2025. The scholarship winner will be publicly announced at the International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) in June. While ACSA understands it may be difficult for the winner to attend the ISC, at the very least, ACSA may attempt to make an electronic presentation to the winner and record it for playback at the ISC.






